braham had two important grandchildren before he died: a set of twin boys. Everyone knows them as Jacob and Esau, yet few give a passing thought to the fact that when- ever the two names are spoken of together, Jacob, the younger, is mentioned *first* (see Joshua 24:4 and Hebrews 11:20).

Esau made a simple and spontaneous choice one day in a field near a warm fire. A choice that stood as a confession about his attitude toward *God* more clearly than anything he would ever do in his entire life. Esau's crucial flaw was forgetting about the Story of God and his place in it. In Scripture, this one deed is identified with a subtle, insidious attitude that has potential for devastation in the life of any follower of Christ.

STUDY QUESTIONS...

- 1. Read over the following passages in Genesis and in your own words, write out the amazing things must *Isaac* have heard, seen, and believed about himself *and* his descendants?
 - a. Genesis: 12:1-2 -
 - b. Genesis: 13:14-16 -
 - c. Genesis: 18:16-19 -
 - d. Genesis, 22:1-18-
 - e. Genesis 26:1-5 -

- 2. Why is it reasonable to assume that Esau and Jacob knew all of this too?
- 3. Look at the verses below that deal with some of the things that were true of firstborn sons in the ancient world. What do these verses say about the firstborn?
 - a. Exodus 22:29 –
 - b. Deuteronomy 21:17 –
 - c. Genesis 27:18-29 (Keep in mind that Isaac *thought* he was describing his firstborn son, Esau, here!)
- 4. Look back over your responses to the three questions above. What is it that Esau likely knew about himself and the place he was to play in the promises of God as the firstborn?
- 5. In Genesis 25:29-34, Esau gives away something of great significance for a moment of satisfaction in the form of a warm meal. It says he "despised" his birthright. This is the same word that is used to describe Goliath's attitude toward David in 1 Samuel 17:42. Imagine what the Philistine Goliath was *thinking* about David, and use that to write out in your own words what was very likely Esau's perspective on God and His will for his own life.
- 6. Read Hebrews 12:14-17 a couple times. The word "godless" in Hebrews 12:16 has its roots in pagan, not Christian, thought. It meant "profane" or "unholy." The word was used to describe a person for whom *nothing* was sacred, one whose life, as it was lived out, had no genuine thought for God. The following passages describe or illustrate what "godlessness" looks like. Use what you see in each passage to help you complete the phrase, "A godless person is one who"
 - a. Genesis 25:30-34 "A godless person is one who...

- 7. The word "ungodly" is also used with the word, "godless" in 1 Timothy 1:9. How would you differentiate between these two words? Write out a brief definition of each:
 - a. ungodliness
 - b. godlessness
- 8. Godlessness is essentially leaving God out of places where He belongs. What principle does Paul lay down about the *relationship* between our conversation and our conduct in 2 Timothy 2:16?

Probably the best examples in the Bible of godless people are some of the prominent religious leaders during the time of Christ, the Pharisees. They truly were "religious" without God (2 Timothy 3:5). Jesus addresses them very forcefully and honestly in Matthew 23. Study this chapter for additional insights into what godlessness looks like and what God values and what He dislikes.
