BIDING PRINCIPLE – God's intention is to make me less and less like Adam, and more and more like Jesus, through the power of His Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit's work in my life that produces change and brings glory to my Father, not my own work on myself.

any say that the Holy Spirit is the "humblest" member of the Trinity. His passion is to glorify the Father and the Son and to minister to those in the believing family. And it seems that He prefers to do it without drawing attention to Himself. We don't have the same biographical information for this third member of the Trinity that the Gospels provide about Jesus. The Spirit is less like a star and more like a supporting actor in the One Story of the One God. Consequently, two extremes often exist among believers when it comes to the Holy Spirit. We either become *preoccupied* with His power and ministry, or we *fearfully* stifle His inspiration and power, looking instead to ourselves to bring about change in our own lives and our churches.

The Bible contains nearly 150 clear references to the Holy Spirit and His work in the world. So, claiming ignorance about Him isn't an option. Understanding the role of the Holy Spirit in our own transformation will fill us with hope, direction, and humility. It also will spare us from discouragement and disillusionment as we seek to "partner" with God in His work to conform us to the likeness of His Son.

LOOKING BACK...

he clear teaching of Scripture is that we are destined to be prisoners of our own sin unless God Himself works His will in us. The process of changing the image bearers of Adam into the likeness of Jesus is a supernatural work that only God can do. But, the process is not automatic. It involves—perhaps is even dependent upon—our cooperation and continual participation with God throughout the process.

We also learn from God's Word that the Holy Spirit empowers *and* guides each believer to become like Christ. This is reasonable since Jesus Himself relied on the same source of power while He was on earth. Our God is a personal God. The Bible teaches that the Spirit's transforming influence can be resisted and thwarted. It can even be snuffed out. Left to ourselves, we are more likely to grieve and sin against Him, than joyfully submit. But, submission to this divine enabler and transformer is the most necessary role we play, if we're ever to become a people who glorify God and reflect the character of His Son.
