BIDING PRINCIPLE – Our words are a clear reflection of who we are, but they also affect what we are becoming. As we seek to be conformed to the image of Jesus Christ, controlling our speech is essential.

cores of books, articles, and sermons have been written and preached about the suffering and patience of Job. But most of our insights about Job are essentially confined to the book that bears his name. In fact, he is mentioned by name only three other times in the entire Bible! About six centuries before Jesus, in a final statement through the prophet Ezekiel, God reaffirmed Job's character as one whose heart was right before Him.

The book of Job is basically a written record of conversations among Job, several men, Satan, and God. And while it is true that his patience and faith provide a great model for us to imitate, it is also true that the book and life of Job can teach us a great deal about God's desire to transform the speech of those who claim to know Him.

**KEY SCRIPTURE:** Job 29

### STUDY QUESTIONS...

#### **LOOKING BACK...**

In Ezekiel 14:20 God indicates that Job was one of the most upright men who ever lived. And in the book that bears his name, we see not only how he responded to an avalanche of suffering that God allowed and ordained, but also how he handled being wrongly accused by close friends. And through it all, even though some of his thinking was off, Job's *speech* was faultless before God. The Bible portrays our mouth as the exit ramp of the *heart*. What we say reflects who we are. For this reason, God places a very high premium on our *speech*. In fact, the relationship between our heart and our mouth is so close that at the Day of Judgment our *words* will be the evidence used to describe the condition of our hearts! So if we *are* being being sanctified (transformed to resemble Jesus), how we talk is one thing that others should clearly see changing; the reflection of what is happening to our hearts.
