"Ancient Friendship in Modern Times"

BIDING PRINCIPLE – How many friends we *have* is never an issue to God. His concern is whether or not we are *being* the type of friend He desires to the people He brings into our lives. True friendship requires mutual honesty and commitment, not only towards each other, but more importantly, toward God.

"Friends drive you to or from God." – JerryWhite

Jonathan was the eldest son of Israel's first king, Saul. By birth he was the heir apparent, destined to become Israel's second king. He was also a valiant warrior, highly respected and popular within his father's army. But in the sovereign plan of God, he was to play a role altogether different from what he expected.

Jonathan's father forfeited his right to be king, so God chose another man to rule over His people — an obscure young man named David. These two young men, David and Jonathan, not only were destined to become brothers-in-law and share a family heritage, but also to become the dearest and purest of friends. Jonathan's name means "gift from God," and that is surely what he was to David.

Jonathan stands tall in the pages of Scripture, not only as an example of what friendship can *become* when the Lord is at the center rather than the circumference, but also as one of the clearest examples of what a true friend looks like. In our age of "likes" and social media, Jonathan demonstrates the fidelity is more important than immediacy.

STUDY QUESTIONS...

The Hebrew word for "covenant" here is an alliance or agreement of a very serious and binding nature between two parties. (It's the same word used for God's "agreements" with Noah, Abraham, and Moses.)

Jesus called his eleven faithful followers "friends" three times in John 15:13-15. The emphasis shifts from "servants" to "friends," with love as the key catalyst. That's because a special love exists between friends that is different from the broad, unconditional love that believers are to show to other believers, people in general, and even their enemies

Friendship love is a love that has to go *both* directions. It gives *and* receives. It is a love that has shared expectations. Jesus made this clear when He said, "You are my friends *if* you do what I command" (John 15:14).

A fruitful study awaits you in a study of Jesus in the Gospel of John with the goal of looking for his relationship with his disciples in a friendship. What were their expectations of each other? Look for those that were fulfilled and those that were unrealistic. How was their relationship with Jesus a "two-way street"?
