### **AQUILA & PRISCILLA**

"Ministry As A Lifestyle."

**BIDING PRINCIPLE** – Ministry to others is not just the prerogative of paid professionals, or "super Christians." It is the privilege, joy, and responsibility of anyone who claims to be a follower of Jesus.

"There is not a single passage in the Old Testament or the New Testament where the filling of the Holy Spirit is spoken of and not connected with the testimony of service." — R.A. Torrey

The Bible does not contain many stories about married couples in which both play a vital role in God's Story. Instead, it tends to focus on one partner or the other. We read about Peter, but never about his wife. We read about a woman named Mary whose husband oversaw Herod's household, but we know little about him. One exception is a couple we meet in the book of Acts named Aquila and Priscilla. It is interesting that of the seven times their names appear in Scripture, they are always together. And they are always engaged in ministry. Wherever they traveled, from Rome to Greece to Asia, they seemed to have one thing in mind—helping people come to faith and then to grow. As they opened their hearts to people wherever they traveled, their homes became churches! While it is certainly true that they ministered tirelessly and continually, I suspect that they never thought of themselves as "ministers" in our modern sense of the word. Rather, they probably saw themselves simply as Christians, growing in their knowledge of and love for God, and living lives of faithfulness to Him.

Use your imagination to create a short, possible scenario that explains Priscilla and Aquila's conversion to Christ after arriving in Corinth from Rome (study the passage carefully for details).

- 2. Read Acts 18:5-11. What do you imagine became of Paul's relationship with this married couple during the eighteen months he remained in Corinth?
- 3. Read the following verses and chart a short history of Aquila and Priscilla's life. (The verses are arranged in chronological order.)

### LOOKING BACK...

t is virtually impossible to read the Bible and not see the obvious truth that God expects His children to reinvest into His kingdom what He has given them, which typically involves other people. In fact, Jesus warns us that if we try to hoard what we have, we will lose our lives. Perhaps this is why there are so many who claim to know Jesus but whose lives are characterized by an absence of joy and a presence of depression or boredom. Pouring our lives out for others is not merely the job of "paid professionals." It is the calling of anyone who claims to be a Jesus-follower. In fact, it often turns out that it's at the intersection of our life with that of someone else's that God does His most remarkable, joyful, and permanent work in ours.

Remember that Priscilla and Aquila *learned* how to minister to people by spending time with Paul, for whom ministry was simply a way of life, a lifestyle. Think of the people you are in touch with each week. Are they moving you toward true ministry or away from it?

In light of this study, who is someone you may need to spend *more* time with, and who is someone you need to spend *less* time with? What can you do this week to make changes?
