"You're Being Watched."

BIDING PRINCIPLE – Conversion begins as an intensely private matter involving our deepest secrets and darkest sins. But whether or not we are becoming more like Jesus increasingly becomes public evidence that demands a verdict.

"Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples." — Jesus of Nazareth

here has been a lot of discussion and concern among Christian leaders recently about the "marginalization of religious faith." In other words, the religious faith that once has a chair at the table of public discourse in our culture has increasingly been moved to the corner of the room. One response to this has been the many efforts to restore biblical faith to the center of the public square. Unfortunately, this has not halted the conflict. Paul's instructions to a struggling young pastor facing a penetrating battle of "Jesus vs. culture" in his own day sheds much light on the relationship between the modem person of faith and the watching world.
