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THE "WOMAN AT THE WELL"

"The Power of Incarnational Ministry"

BIDING PRINCIPLE – The most efficient and permanent way to impact the world for Jesus Christ has always been, and continues to be, one dedicated life touching another.

"0 the blessed influence of one true loving human soul on another!" – George Eliot

The stled between the two regions where Jesus spent most of His time—Galilee and Judah was an area known as Samaria. It was shunned at best and despised at worst by devout Jews of Jesus' day. In typical fashion, He would journey *through* it on His way to Galilee from Jerusalem rather than around it like most of the Jewish priests and religious leaders.

On one such journey, Jesus arrived at a well in Samaria at high noon, hours after the women of the area had left, having gathered their water for the day. A solitary figure soon joined Him. First, it's really significant that she was a Samaritan, second, that she was a woman, and finally, that she was a woman who'd lost the respect of her village, any of which would have been grounds for Jesus to shun her too. But He didn't. In fact, the story that unfolds from this encounter is an arresting example of how God prefers to work in this world, enlarging His kingdom one life at a time, face-to-face, one person touching the life of another. It's the polar opposite of our pixel-to-pixel existence that we've somehow come to accept as normal.

- 8. If you were able to choose between leading 1,000 people to Christ per day for the rest of your life or pouring your time into one person per *year*, with the goal that that person would do the same, which of the two would you choose? Why?
- 9. When it comes to the two methods of ministry in the above question, you might be surprised to discover the first would take over 2,000 years to reach the world with the gospel, but the second method would accomplish the same task in slightly over thirty years!

 - b. Which of these two *perspectives* on ministry do you think requires more faith? Why?

You may be surprised to discover the extent to which the lives of Jesus and Paul, the two most visible people in the New Testament in terms of effective ministry, reflect a commitment to *individuals* rather than crowds. Even though they both ministered to crowds whenever the opportunity arose, it is obvious that they understood the power of reaching the world one life at a time. Take some time and read through the four Gospels while keeping a record of how many individuals Jesus ministered to whose lives were permanently changed who then went out and impacted others.
